



Introduction

Every two years, the Delaware Department of Labor produces industry and occupation projections at the statewide level for a period ten years into the future. This publication presents Delaware's efforts for the period 2022 to 2032. It supersedes the last such set of projections, which were generated for the 2020-2030 period and published in July, 2022.



Delaware is projected to have 36,240 more jobs in 2032 than in 2022, for an average annual growth rate of 0.7 percent. Nationally, jobs are projected to grow at an annual rate of 0.3 percent. The base year employment of 2022 for these projections occurred two years after a recession that was due to the coronavirus pandemic. The recession of 2020 was very short, lasting only two months, as measured by the official recession dating body, the National Bureau of Economic Research, but the recession was particularly deep in terms of job losses. The subsequent recovery was particularly strong with all Delaware jobs lost at the total non-

farm employment level having been regained by February 2022 as measure by the seasonally adjusted Current Employment Statistics program. Healthcare and Social Assistance, already Delaware largest industry sector in terms of employment, is expected to have the most growth with over one-third of all new jobs created.

Job openings occur when the number of jobs at employers within the state are increasing (growth), or when workers currently in those jobs either find work in another field (transfers), or exit the labor force altogether (exits). Transfer and exits are also called separations. Total job openings are the summation of openings due to growth plus openings due to separations. Occupation Projections by Occupational Group


In this section, we present job projections and associated data for 529 specific occupations in Delaware, listed by major occupational group. The data elements provided for each occupation are: the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) code, an estimate of the total number of filled jobs in the state in 2022, the projection of total filled jobs in 2032, the skill category, wage category, job availability, and usual education, work experience, and training requirements. In the following section we present these same occupations arranged by the 16 career clusters used by state educators. There you will find the forecasted annual growth rate, annual openings due to growth, annual exits, annual transfers, and total annual openings, as well as the 2022 estimated average annual wage for each occupation.

Estimates of past employment levels and projections of future employment levels do not refer to the demand

for workers, nor to the supply of workers. They refer to the equilibrium point where the supply and demand for labor are equal, that is, filled jobs. Labor demand and labor supply each have many possible employment levels, depending on the wage level. The wage level adjusts until the supply and demand for any given occupation are the same - that point is the employment estimate or projection for that occupation. Any forecast a decade into the future that predicts shortages or surpluses ignores this fact and is not well grounded in economic theory.

For ease of comparison, this first section presents occupational wages by wage categories. To create the categories, we divided the 527 occupations with wages into quintiles (2 occupations have wages that are not available due to confidentially reasons). There are about 105 occupations in each wage category. These categories are based on the 2022 average annual wage for each

occupation. Of course, it should be recognized that some people working in each occupation were paid less than the average, and some were paid more than the average, and that those just entering an occupation should expect to be paid less than this amount. More detailed wage distributions for most of these occupations, including estimates for entry- and experienced level wages, can be obtained by contacting our office.

The lowest paying occupations (*Low*) paid below \$39,200 per year. The next lowest-paying occupations, those in the *Below Average* category (-Avg), had average wages between \$39,201 and \$50,000 per year. The middle category, *Average* (Avg) paid from \$50,001 to \$64,000. The second highest-paying category, *Above Average* (+Avg), had average wages from \$64,001 to \$86,000, while the highest-paying occupations (*High*) had average annual wages exceeding \$86,001. Wages that have been suppressed or are not available have been listed as NA.

The placement of occupations into job availability categories is based on the expected total annual openings. There are four categories of job availability: *Poor*, with fewer than 10 annual total openings projected; *Fair*, with from 10 to 39 annual total openings projected; *Good*, with from 40 to 99 such openings; and *Excellent* (Excl), with 100 or more total annual openings projected. There are 119 occupations with Excellent job availability, another 100 in the Good category, 172 with Fair job availability prospects, and 138 in the Poor category.

The rest of the data refer to education, experience, and training requirements. There are seven levels of education, which are intended to describe the typical education level of someone entering the occupation. The education categories range from no formal educational credential (NFE), high school diploma or equivalent (HS), postsecondary vocational training (VocEd), associate's degree (Assoc), bachelor's degree (Bach), and master's degree (Mast) through doctoral or professional degree (PhD/prof). Some occupations typically require experience working in a related field. The work experience measure captures this as one of three possible values: none, less than five years (<5), and five years or more (5+). The on-the-job training field has six possible measures for the typical amount of training required to be considered competent in the occupation. These range from none, short-term on-the-job training of one month or less (SOJT), moderate-term on-the-job training of from one month to one year (MOJT), long-term on-the-job training of over one year (LOJT), and apprenticeship (App) through internship or residency (Int). The skill category places each occupation into the high skill (H), middle skill (M), or low skill (L) category based on a combination of education, work experience, training, and formal certification. We worked closely with the Delaware Department of Education's Career and Technical Education office to develop the categories, which are illustrated in the table on the next page.

Wages by Level of Education, 2022



Occupation Projections by Career Cluster

This section contains occupations grouped by career clusters. The US Department of Education developed these 16 groupings as a way to link school and work, helping students to choose a curriculum which is best suited to their career plans. The occupations listed here are the same ones displayed in the previous section; they are simply organized differently and present some different information.

In table 2, occupations are arranged alphabetically within each of the 16 career clusters. For each occupation, we provide its SOC code, forecasted average annual growth rate from 2022 to 2032, average annual openings due to growth for that period, average annual exits (workers leaving an occupation and the labor force), average annual transfers (workers leaving an occupation and transferring to a different occupation), annual total openings, and the estimated 2022 average annual wage. The SOC code can be used to refer back to the previous section to find the usual education, experience, and training requirements for the occupation.

The *Hospitality & Tourism* cluster is expected to generate the most job openings, with 119,419 projected. The *Health Science* cluster has the most job growth projected, with 10,779. The clusters with the fewest job openings projected are *Arts, Audio/Video Technology & Communications*, with 3,497; *Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics (STEM)*, with 4,795; and *Government & Public Administration*, with 5,629. It may be surprising for *Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics (STEM)* to be on the list of fewest job openings, but it is in part due to *Information Technology*, which is usually considered part of STEM, having its own cluster.

While *Information Technology* job openings may be relatively scarce, it is the highest-paying cluster; its occupations paid an average wage of \$110,977 in 2022. *Science*, *Technology, Engineering & Mathematics (STEM)* was next highest, at \$109,936. *Hospitality and Tourism* again had the lowest average wage. This cluster's occupations paid an average \$33,037 in 2022. The cluster with the second lowest average pay is *Human Services*, at \$44,730.

Industry Projections

Delaware is projected to add 36,240 jobs over the 2022-2032 projection period. The average annual job growth for Delaware during the ten-year projection period is expected to be 0.7 percent per year. This is more than the rate that the US Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) is projecting for the nation at 0.3 percent per year. Delaware Goods Producing industries are projected to add 4,970 jobs, while the majority of new jobs are expected in the Service Providing sector with 30,880. Self Employed Workers are expected to add 390 new jobs.

Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting is expected to gain 280 jobs over the next ten years with job gains in Animal production and Support activities for agriculture and forestry. Crop production is projected to lose 230 jobs over the 10-year period.

The *Construction* supersector is expected to add 1,520 jobs over the decade with an average annual growth rate of 0.6 percent. The projected job gains is mainly being driven by job increases in the *Specialty trade contractors* subsectors.

The *Manufacturing* supersector is estimated to increase over the projection period by 3,180 jobs. *Food Manufacturing* is estimated to see the largest gains in Manufacturing, while the biggest losses are estimated to come from *Plastics and rubber products manufacturing* and *Furniture and related product manufacturing*.

The Trade, Transportation, and Utilities supersector is comprised of Wholesale Trade, Retail Trade, Transportation and Warehousing and Utilities. Wholesale Trade is estimated to lose 340 jobs over the 2022-2032 projection period. Retail Trade is estimated to gain 1,810 jobs over the projection period. Retail Trade job increases in such areas as Food and beverage retailers and Clothing and clothing accessories retailers, while the losses are in Sporting goods, hobby, musical instrument, and book retailers and Furniture, home furnishings and electronics retailers. Transportation and Warehousing is expected to gain 3,690 net jobs over the projection period, an annual average increase of 1.6 percent, making it the second fastest growing industry sector. These gains are driven by Warehousing and storage and Couriers and messengers.

Information is estimated to lose 810 jobs over the decade and with an annual average decline of

2.3 percent it is projected to be the second fastest shrinking industry sector. It is predicted that *Information* will continue its long-run decline that started in 2001. Job losses are being driven by a decline in *Telecommunications*.

The Financial Activities supersector is comprised of the *Finance and Insurance* and the *Real Estate and Rental and Leasing* sector. *Finance and Insurance* is projected to add 2,360 jobs over the ten-year projection period. Most jobs in this sector will be created in *Securities, commodity contracts, investments*. In the *Real Estate and Rental and Leasing* sector, there are estimated to be 40 net new jobs created.



In the Professional & Business Services supersector, Professional and Technical Services is expected to lose 110 jobs, Management of Companies and Enterprises to lose 460 jobs, and Administrative and Waste Services to add 470 jobs over the projection period.

The Education and Health Services supersector is comprised of *Educational Services* and *Health Care and Social Assistance*. *Educational Services* is expected to gain 4,800 jobs during the projected period. *Health Care and Social Assistance*, Delaware's largest industry in term of employment, is projected to add the most jobs over the 10-year period and also be the fastest growing industry sector with an annual growth rate of 1.7%. The 13,280 jobs created by this sector will represent 36.6% of all projected jobs to be created.

In the Leisure and Hospitality supersector, *Arts*, *Entertainment*, *and Recreation* is projected to lose 220 jobs over the decade. *Accommodation and Food Services* is second in terms of projected job gains with 6,060 new jobs over the decade, with a projected annual average growth rate of 1.3 percent, the third fastest growing industry sector in terms of the annual growth rate.

Other Services, Except Public Administration is expected to add 410 jobs over the projection period with an average annual growth rate of 0.2 percent. Projected job gains in Other Services, Except Public Administration is being driven by Religious, grantmaking, civic, professional organizations and Personal and laundry services.

Government is estimated to lose 200 jobs over the 10-year projection period. *Local government*, excluding education and hospitals is expected to add 300 jobs, while State government, excluding education and hospitals is expected to lose 570 jobs and Federal government, excluding postal service is expected to lose 130 jobs.

Projected Annual Rate of Growth by Industry Sector, 2022–2032


