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### Introduction

Every two years, the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) produces industry and occupation forecasts for a period ten years into the future and the states are asked to do the same for

their respective economies. This publication presents Delaware's efforts for the period 2016 to 2026. It supersedes the last such set of projections, which were generated for the 2014-2024 period and published in August, 2016.

Delaware is projected to have 28,670 more jobs in 2026 than in 2016, for an average annual growth rate of 0.6 percent. **Health Care and Social Assistance**, already the state's biggest employer by a wide margin, is again expected to show the most growth, accounting for one-third of the total new jobs projected.

Job openings occur when the number of jobs at employers within the state are increasing (growth), or when workers currently in those jobs either find work in another field or exit the labor force altogether (replacements). For these projections a new methodology for estimating replacements has been developed by BLS, resulting in a large increase in projected replacement needs compared with previous projection rounds. In the last set of projections for the period 2014 to 2024, there were fewer than 3 job openings due to replacement for each opening due to growth. In this set of projections there are 15 job openings due to replacement for every one due to growth. As a result, we have changed our criteria for determining job availability from openings due solely to growth, and now use total job openings instead. 
## **Occupation Projections by Occupational Group**

In this section, we present job projections and associated data for 504 specific occupations in Delaware, listed by major occupational group. The data elements provided for each occupation are: the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) code, an estimate of the total number of filled jobs in the state in 2016, the projection of total filled jobs in 2026, the skill category, wage category, job availability, and usual education, experience, and training requirements. In the following section we present these same occupations arranged by the 16 career clusters used by state educators. There you will find the forecasted annual growth rate, annual openings due to growth, annual openings due to net replacement, and the 2016 estimated average annual wage for each occupation.

Estimates of past employment levels and projections of future employment levels do not refer to the demand for workers, nor to the supply of workers. They refer to the equilibrium point where the supply and demand for labor are equal, that is, filled jobs. Labor demand and labor supply each have many possible employment levels, depending on the wage level. The wage level adjusts until the supply and demand for any given occupation are the same - that point is the employment estimate or projection for that occupation. Any forecast a decade into the future that predicts shortages or surpluses ignores this fact and is not well grounded in economic theory.

For ease of comparison, this first section presents occupational wages by wage categories. To create the categories, we divided the 504 occupations into quintiles. There are 101 occupations in each category except for Average, which has 100 occupations. These categories are based on the 2016 average annual wage for each occupation. Of course, it should be recognized that some people working in each occupation were paid less than

the average, and some were paid more than the average, and that those just entering an occupation should expect to be paid less than this amount. More detailed wage distributions for most of these occupations, including estimates for entry- and experienced level wages, can be obtained by contacting our office.

The lowest-paying 101 occupations (Low) paid below \$31,700 per year. The next lowest-paying 101 occupations, those in the Below Average category (-Avg), had average wages between \$31,701 and \$42,000 per year. The middle category, Average (Avg) paid from \$42,001 to \$57,000. The second highest-paying category, Above Average (+Avg), had average wages from \$57,001 to \$76,500, while the 102 highest-paying occupations (High) had average annual wages exceeding \$76,500.

The placement of occupations into job availability categories is based on the expected total annual openings. This is a change from previous publications, where it was based solely on growth. The change was made because the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) changed the methodology for estimating replacements, resulting in a dramatic increase in replacement needs (a replacement is when someone leaves an occupation, creating a job opening with no net increase in the occupation when that opening is filled). The replacements estimate is about five times higher than in the last set of projections, while our projections for overall growth have gone down. In these current projections, most job openings occur when an incumbent transfers into a new occupation of exits the labor force altogether, not when a new or expanding business creates a new job.


There are four categories of job availability: Poor, with fewer than 10 annual total openings projected; Fair, with from 10 to 39 annual total openings projected; Good, with from 40 to 99 such openings; and Excellent (Excl), with 100 or more total annual openings projected. There are 119 occupations with Excellent job availability, another 112 in the Good category, 170 with Fair job availability prospects, and 103 in the Poor category.

The rest of the data refer to education, experience, and training requirements. There are seven levels of

education, which are intended to describe the typical education level of someone entering the occupation. The education categories range from no formal educational credential (NFE), high school diploma or equivalent (HS), postsecondary vocational training (VocEd), associate's degree (Assoc), bachelor's degree (Bach), and master's degree (Mast) through doctoral or professional degree (PhD/prof). Some occupations typically require experience working in a related field. The work experience measure captures this as one of three possible values: none, less than five years (<5), and five years or more (5+). The on-the-job training field has six possible measures for the typical amount of training required to be considered competent in the occupation. These range from none, short-term on-the-job training of one month or less (SOJT), moderate-term on-the-job training of from one month to one year (MOJT), long-term on-the-job training of over one year (LOJT), and apprenticeship (App) through internship or residency (Int). The skill category places each occupation into the high skill (H), middle skill (M), or low skill (L) category based on a combination of education, work experience, training, and formal certification. We worked closely with the Delaware Department of Education's Career and Technical Education office to develop the categories, which are illustrated in the table below.



## **Occupation Projections by Career Cluster**

This section contains occupations grouped by career clusters. The US Department of Education developed these 16 groupings as a way to link school and work, helping students to choose a curriculum which is best suited to their career plans. The occupations listed here are the same ones displayed in the previous section; they are simply organized differently and present some different information.

Occupations are arranged alphabetically within each of the 16 career clusters. For each occupation, we provide its SOC code, forecasted average annual growth rate from 2016 to 2026, average annual openings due to growth for that period, average annual openings due to net replacement of workers (the total expected job openings in an average year would be the sum of these two numbers), and the estimated 2016 average annual wage. The SOC code can be used to refer back to the previous section to find the usual education, experience, and training requirements for the occupation.

Once again, the **Hospitality & Tourism** cluster is expected to generate the most job openings, with 108,129 projected (methodological changes put in place by BLS

have dramatically increased this number over previous projections). This cluster has a great deal of turnover, and over 100,000 of those jobs are replacements of existing workers. The *Health Science* cluster has the most new jobs projected, with 6,962. The clusters with the fewest job openings projected are *Arts, Audio/Video Technology* & *Communications*, with 3,175; *Government & Public Administration*, with 4,457; and *Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics (STEM)*, with 6,834. This last may be surprising, but it is due to *Information Technology*, which is usually considered part of STEM, having its own cluster.

While job openings may be relatively scarce, *Science*, *Technology*, *Engineering & Mathematics (STEM)* is again the highest-paying cluster; its occupations paid an average wage of \$100,773 in 2016. *Information Technology* was next highest, at \$91,826. *Hospitality and Tourism* again had the lowest average wage. This cluster's occupations paid an average \$25,021 in 2016, just 0.9 percent above its average two years ago. The cluster with the second lowest average pay is *Transportation*, *Distribution & Logistics*, at \$36,173.

## **Industry Projections**

Average annual job growth during the 10-year projection period is expected to be 0.6 percent per year. This is the same growth rate that the US Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) is projecting for the nation. The relationship between DE and US growth rates is interesting, and far from random. Calculating growth rates for every 10-year period since the data begin in 1939, Delaware's job growth exceeded the national rate for 26 consecutive periods, up until 1974. Then for 10 straight years, Delaware's job growth lagged the national average. That reversed in the 10-year period ending in 1985, and Delaware grew faster up until 2008. In the nine years since, Delaware is once again lagging behind.

Average annual job growth for all 10-year periods in the state since 1939 is nearly 2.2 percent, so a rate of 0.6 percent would be significantly below that, but it would represent the fastest job growth since 1998-2008, when Delaware jobs grew at a 0.9 percent average pace. Much of this slowdown is due to demographics.

Current projections from the Delaware Population Consortium have the population of people 16 years old and over (the potential labor force) growing by 0.8 percent per year from 2016 to 2026. In the age groups with greatest labor force participation, from 20 to 64 years of age, the projected growth is a much lower 0.13 percent per year. Given that, it will require either increases in labor force participation for some groups,

an increase in out-of-state residents commuting into Delaware to work, or both to achieve even 0.6 percent job growth.

Delaware's unemployment rate in the 2016 base year was 4.5 percent. This is reasonably close to the expected unemployment rate at a time of full employment, so unlike most recent projections, there is little expected job gain due to the business cycle. The future projection period (2026) is assumed to be a state of full employment (unemployment rate about 4.0 percent), so only a few thousand jobs would be expected due to the cyclical movement to full employment.

At the time this is being written, mid-2018, Delaware is in its ninth year of economic expansion. The probability that this expansion will continue unabated through the projection year of 2026 is very nearly zero. Therefore, a recession is assumed to occur at some point during the ten-year projection period. Though it can vary, on average a recession implies three years of zero job growth for the state. This means the projected 28,670 net new jobs represents just over 4,000 new jobs per year of economic expansion.

**Health Care and Social Assistance**, already by far the state's largest industry sector in terms of jobs (it exceeds federal, state, and local government employment combined), is projected to add more than twice as


many jobs as the next biggest job gainer, *Finance* and *Insurance*. Five sectors are projected to lose jobs over the 10-year projection period: Agriculture, Forestry, and Fishing (-210); Information (-410); Retail Trade (-840); Wholesale Trade (-980); and Manufacturing (-1,370).

There are seven industry sectors projected to grow faster per year than the overall state average: Management of Companies and Enterprises (2.0 percent), Health Care and Social Assistance (1.3 percent), Finance and Insurance (1.1 percent), Accommodation and Food Services (0.9 percent), Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation (0.9 percent), Administrative and Waste Services (0.7 percent), and Other Services (0.7 percent). Along with the five sectors mentioned above that are projected to lose jobs, four other sectors are projected to grow at below-average rates: **Educational Services** (0.5 percent), **Real Estate and Rental and Leasing** (0.5 percent), Government (0.3 percent), and Utilities (0.2 percent). Construction, Transportation and Warehousing, and Professional, Scientific, and **Technical Services** are all projected to grow at the overall average rate of 0.6 percent per year.
